#### **GUIDE FOR SHOW 2005**

#### THINGS TO REMEMBER WHEN GROWING FOR SHOW

- Keep all dead wood and leaves out of the branches.
- Watch for insects and keep plants free by spraying or manually killing.
- Remember once they get a good hold the more difficult they are to eradicate.
- From early spring, treat compost for vine weevil attack irregular notches bitten from edge of leaves. Vine weevils can be found using a torch after dark and killing them.

- Watch for rust, separate any infected plants; destroy any infected leaves (not in the greenhouse or in the proximity of other plants as the spores are airborne). Spray all plants with a fungicide.
- Keep the greenhouse well aerated. Plants are better outside when the weather is fit, preferably in a shady spot.
- Spots of water cause browning of buds and flowers when left in the sunshine.
- Feed regularly with a weak solution of feed.
